Go North East bus **128** gives easy connections in Durham Bus Station with the Prince Bishops' 20 buses to & from Belmont, The Raintons and Houghton-le-Spring, also the PRONTO X21 buses to & from Croxdale, Spennymoor and Bishop Auckland.

Go North East **WAGGONWAY** 28 and 28A buses from Chester-le-Street, Birtley, Gateshead and Newcastle run to the Beamish Museum Entrance Building on Saturday and Sunday ALL YEAR, also Monday to Friday from 25 March 2013 until 25 October 2013.

Other links to Beamish Museum Main Gate are provided by the lime 8 and 78A buses from Sunderland, Chester-le-Street, Stanley and Consett.

Connections can also be made in Chester-le-Street town centre with Go North East buses to Durham, Bishop Auckland, Washington, South Shields and Newcastle.

All about Beamish

Entrance Building

This is where you start and end your visit to Beamish Museum.

Enjoy delicious coffee and scones in the Coffee Shop and browse through a wonderful selection of quality gifts and souvenirs in the Gift Shop, or treat yourself to a memento of your visit.



1913 The Colliery Village

A typical Colliery Village of North East England in 1913 that let's you see how pitmen and their families lived and worked, also explore the pit cottages and catch a lesson in the Village School, or a magic lantern show in the Methodist Chapel.

Go underground at a real drift mine and see the magnificent 150-year old steam winding engine in action.

Trams and Historic Transport

Take a ride on one of the six beautifully restored Beamish trams, which take visitors on a circular journey into the past.

Start your journey back in time at the Entrance Building and alight at stops for Pockerley Manor, The Town, The Colliery Village or Home Farm.

1913 Home Farm

Home Farm, once part of the Beamish Estate, is a working farm of 1913 with traditional breeds of cattle, sheep, pigs and poultry being bred here that can be seen in the farm buildings and fields around the Museum.

The kitchen, scullery and pantry in the farmhouse kitchen show how the farmer's wife spent her day.

Regional Resource Centre

The Regional Resource Centre houses the core collections of Beamish, with state-of-the-art roller racking providing storage for thousands of artefacts.

A friendly search room is available by appointment, providing facilities for research and Beamish collections can be viewed on computer.

Regional Museums Store

Many unique artefacts of the region's rich social, industrial, transport and maritime history are kept here and a viewing gallery gives visitors a glimpse into this vast treasure house.

1913 The Town

Stroll down the cobbled street of The Town, typical of a market town in 1913 to visit the Dentist's Surgery, the Solicitor's Office and the Music Teacher's home.

Pop into the Co-op Shops, see the beautiful Masonic Hall and period Bank, or watch sweet making in the Sweet Factory and sample delicious treats in the Jubilee Sweet Shop.

1825 Pockerley Manor

Discover life in the early 1800s at Pockerley Manor, the home of a yeoman farming family.

Explore the small Manor House and see how the family and their servants lived.

Try your hand at calligraphy with quill and ink or test the feather beds upstairs.

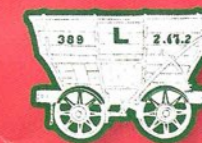
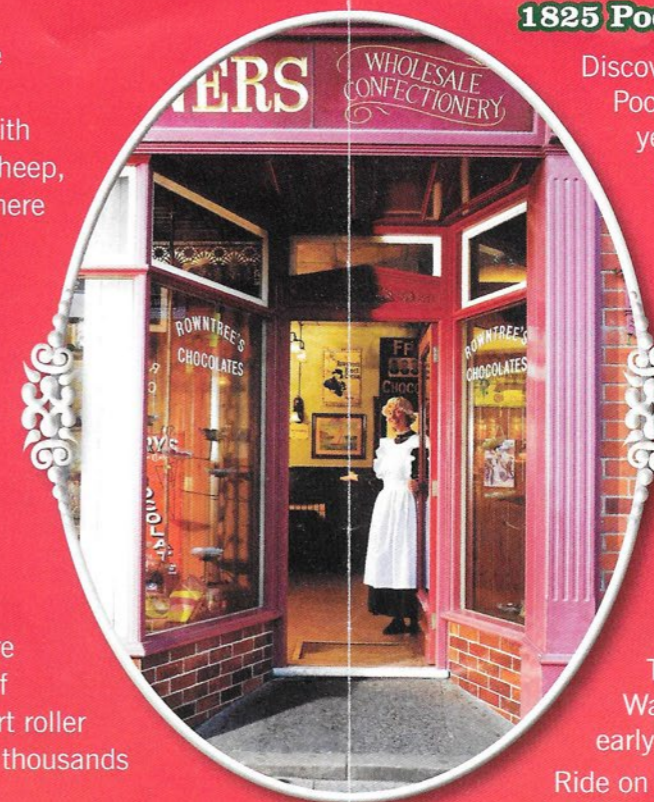
Stroll through beautiful terraced gardens, stocked with the flowers and vegetables of the time.

1825 Pockerley Waggonway

Take a trip on Pockerley Waggonway and experience the early days of rail travel.

Ride on the recreated carriages from the early 1800s, hauled by one of the replica steam locomotives – Puffing Billy, Steam Elephant or Locomotive No 1.

Explore the Great Shed, where locomotives are housed or take a rest in the cosy Engineman's bothy.

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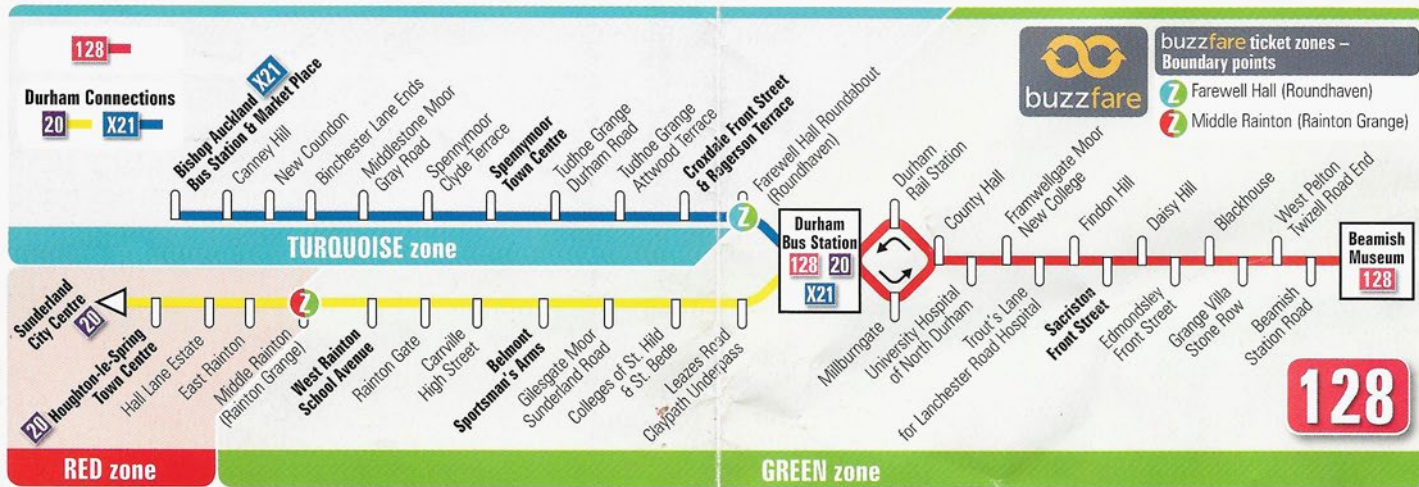
